Context of 'Living Space'

- Imtiaz Dharker's knowledge of Mumbai is evident in this poem
- Imtiaz Dharker is a contemporary poet who was born in Pakistan and grew up in Scotland. She has written five collections of poetry and often deals with themes of identity, the role of women in contemporary society and the search for meaning. She draws on her multi-cultural experience in her work.
- She is also a film director and has scripted a number of documentaries in India, supporting work with women and children. Dharker's intimate knowledge of Mumbai is evident in this poem. She works to raise awareness of issues in other countries.

Living Space

There are just not enough straight lines. That is the problem. nothing is flat or parallel. Beams balance crookedly on supports thrust off the vertical. nails clutch at open seams. the whole structure leans dangerously towards the miraculous.

Into this rough frame, someone has squeezed a living space.

and even dared to place these eggs in a wire basket, fragile curves of white hung out over the dark edge of a slanted universe, gathering the light into themselves, as if they were the bright, thin walls of faith.

Language and structure


Language

- The poet presents us with an image, like a snapshot or photograph of a moment in time. The language used is simple and focuses on the shape of the structure. Words like 'crookedly', 'balance', 'leans' and 'slanted' emphasise the instability of the living space.
- 2. There is a contrast between dark and light with the bright image of the curved smooth eggs standing out against the darkness of the 'slanted universe'.

Structure

- Living Space is written in one long thin stanza with 22 short lines. Each line varies in length. The longest, 'The whole structure leans dangerously', appears considerably longer on the page than the others, perhaps echoing the fact the whole structure is leaning over. The effect of this is to create a poem that appears as precarious as the physical structures it describes. The lines of different lengths seem to jut out into the page like some of the crooked beams the poet presents.
- 2. Dharker uses <u>enjambment</u> throughout this poem with lines spilling over into one another. This reflects the way the slum structures lean over and on top of each other.

Example question

How does Imtiaz Dharker present **place** in this poem?

Introduction: (What it's about)

the poem describes the slums of Mumbai and the instability of the structures, 'balanced crookedly on supports.'

The structure: (How it's set out)

'nails clutch' and 'The whole structure leans dangerously' - enjambment between this line and the next which changes to 'miraculous'

Language: (How the writer uses language)

Balance: images of balance in this poem - the beams, balance between light and dark, the balance between danger and miracle

Faith: eggs offer a symbol of fragility and faith - comparing it to human life

Conclusion: (What the poet wants you to think about)

place and people's adaptation to their circumstances is presented in the poem as an act of faith.
